



Interview with the author James Burke

So the play to begin with is inspired I guess by the birth of my niece. I was kind of like "if I had one lesson to impart on someone who was maybe 10yo, just starting to form their opinions on what's right and wrong, what would it be?" I eventually settled on empathy. Being sensitive to other people's feelings isn't a weakness. It's a strength, basically.

A number of sources of inspiration fed into this. First of all, the experiences of HEPs (highly empathic persons) and also the book Parable of the Sower, which features a person whose empathy later turns out to be a strange source of strength.

The overall setting and aesthetic of the piece was inspired partly by Studio Ghibli films and also Nausicaä of the Valley of the Wind. My own love for nature and belief in the healing power of the outdoors played a big role in determining the setting of the forest. In this regard, and in the separation of Stonewall (civilization) from the forest (wilderness), I was inspired in part by Shakespeare's As You Like It, one of the first plays I performed professionally.

On top of this, the creative team also drew inspiration from the anti-war protest movements of the 1970s and 80s, with a quote, I think from Plato, coming to mind that those who contribute to a better world are not those who obey but those who question it. This is in a large part the contrast between Flick and Gudishews, both good people, but one who merely acts goodness (at the start) and another who questions it.

I was keen for Flick not to be too helpless, but also not too self-sufficient as I don't think "I don't need help from nobody" is a positive message to be sending to everyone. Her strength is thus in listening to those around her and learning what they want so she can find a solution that will help everyone. In this regard, I see her a little like Peter Quill from the Guardians of the Galaxy franchise, but whereas he is a man of action embodying a lot of stereotypically masculine traits, Flick is focused on the power of empathy and how this can overcome problems without the need for physical strength.





Parable of the Sower by Octavia E. Butler


"Parable of the Sower" is a science fiction novel written by American author Octavia E. Butler in 1993. The story takes place in a future world where Earth is ruined by climate change and social inequality. The main character, Lauren Olamina, is a young woman who can feel other people's pain - she has hypersensitivity. After losing her home, she starts a journey north with other people from different backgrounds and walks of life. Along the way, she shares her idea of a new religion called Earthseed. The main ideas of Earthseed are that "God is Change" and that people can "shape God" by controlling the changes around them. Earthseed also teaches that humans are meant to live on other planets and spread life there.


"Parable of the Sower" won several awards, including the 1994 New York Times Notable Book of the Year. It has been turned into an opera and a graphic novel. The book has inspired music and essays about social justice and climate change. In 2021, New York Times readers chose it as the best science fiction book of the past 125 years.

"Parable of the Sower" is the first book in a series. The second book, "Parable of the Talents," was published in 1998. The series is not finished.

Nausicaä of the Valley of the Wind

"Nausicaä of the Valley of the Wind" is a Japanese animated post-apocalyptic fantasy movie from 1984. It was written and directed by Hayao Miyazaki and is based on his manga (comic) series. The story is set in a future world after a nuclear disaster. It follows Nausicaä, a young princess from the Valley of the Wind, who gets involved in a conflict with a kingdom called Tolmekia. Tolmekia wants to destroy a jungle full of giant mutant insects by using an ancient weapon.


The movie was released in Japan on March 11, 1984, and was highly praised for its story, characters, themes, and animation. It is one of the most highly regarded Japanese anime films. Even though it was made before Studio Ghibli was officially created, it is often included in Studio Ghibli collections.

In the mid-to-late 1980s, a heavily edited version of the movie called "Warriors of the Wind" was released in the United States and other countries. Miyazaki did not like this version. In 2005, Walt Disney Pictures released an uncut and re-dubbed version that replaced the earlier edited version.

As You Like It

"As You Like It" is a comedy play by William Shakespeare, written around 1599 and first published in 1623. The exact date of its first performance is not known, but it might have been performed at Wilton House in 1603, a place known for its literary activities during the late 1500s. The play tells the story of Rosalind, who escapes from her uncle's court with her cousin Celia. They go to the Forest of Arden to find safety and eventually fall in love. In the forest, they meet many interesting characters, including Jaques, a thoughtful traveler who delivers one of Shakespeare's most famous lines, "All the world's a stage." Jaques often talks about the difficulties of life, providing a contrast to the other characters.

Over time, people have had different opinions about the play. Some think it's one of Shakespeare's best works, while others believe it's not as good as his other plays.

"As You Like It" has been adapted into radio shows, movies, and musicals.

Guardians of the Galaxy

"Guardians of the Galaxy" is a superhero movie from 2014 based on a Marvel Comics team with the same name. The movie was made by Marvel Studios and released by Walt Disney Studios. It's the 10th movie in the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU). The movie was directed by James Gunn, who also helped write the script. The main characters are played by Chris Pratt, Zoe Saldaña, Dave Bautista, Vin Diesel, and Bradley Cooper.

The story is about Peter Quill (played by Pratt) and a group of alien criminals who team up after stealing a powerful object.

"Guardians of the Galaxy" premiered in Hollywood on July 21, 2014, and was released in U.S. theaters on August 1, 2014, as part of Marvel's Phase Two. The movie was a big hit, earning \$773.3 million worldwide, making it the third-highest-grossing movie of 2014. It was praised for its story, direction, acting, humor, music, visual effects, and action scenes.

The movie was nominated for two Oscars and won many other awards. Two sequels have been released: "Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 2" in 2017 and "Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3" in 2023.
